



• Over 90% of outreach expenses are donated back and double- matched by employer.



# **Meet Our Permanent Foster Care Dogs**

At the close of 2015, BSR hasd14 Permanent Foster Care (PFC) dogs in its care. These dogs are seniors, or have significant medical or emotional issues, which make it best that they remain in their specialized foster homes. BSR financially supports these dogs for the rest of their lives.

Sammi came to BSR after years of over-breeding and suffering from the after-effects of a uterine infection and injury to her leg that threatened the need for amputation. Through a very long period of therapies and treatments, Sammi was able to regain adequate control over the foot and, while not a normal gait, does not risk rubbing it raw with knuckling anymore. Her therapy needs are on going. During her long journey, Sammi developed such a strong dependence on her Foster that she has separation anxiety when the Foster isn't there. Not wanting to risk her physical progress or her emotional health, we deemed her to be PFC material.

Doodle joined the BSR PFC Program in 2015; he spent his formative years chained outside. Doodle came into BSR heartworm positive and filthy. However, with his advanced age and frail health, he was not a candidate for the traditional heartworm treatment and the vet recommended the slow kill method. Because of his age, heart worm status and extended treatment plan, a cyst on his tail, and needing to be transitioned into an indoor/outdoor dog, it was decided it was best to keep Doodle in BSR's care as a PFC dog.

Our first PFC, Harry's story has touched so many. His owner turned over Harry to BSR at the age of 4, and suffered from extreme allergies and a severe skin condition as well as eye contusions and broken teeth. With the love of an amazing foster family, his ongoing medical and therapeutic needs are met. He wears special clothes, to protect his sensitive skin. He has learned to play and is a happy, loved boy.

#### **PFC Mollie Jean**

BSR was notified about Mollie in the summer of 2015. She was turned into a shelter to be euthanized by her owner who couldn't bear to hear her crying. She is a senior, with a severely dislocated front leg from an old injury, and a neurological issue in her hind end that wouldn't support repair of the dislocation. She has a great treatment plan, which consists of medication therapy, along with frequent, short walks, swimming and she enjoys her massages. She is now bearing weight on her dislocated leg!



## PFC Obi



His family surrendered obi at age 11. He had lived his life outside, and was physically in bad shape. What we didn't realize was that he also had severe anxiety- he did significant damage to his foster's home when left alone. Obi is so fortunate to have found a patient and loving foster who has worked with him to build up his confidence. He is living comfortably with his foster parents and new human sister.

# PFC Lilly

Cassie came into BSR's care as a senior with severe anxiety. With an incredibly patient foster and stability, love and care, she is thriving with her canine brothers and sisters.



#### PFC Snickers

Snickers spent 358 days in a shelter as he was confiscated during a raid on an animal hoarder who had over 120 animals and all the animals stayed in the shelter until the case went to court. He knew other animals but was not socialized with people as well as being outside. He first needed to learn to live in a home again. He had an enlarged heart, and we have given him a pacemaker so he can live a long life. He has also had some seizures, however we have an ongoing treatment plan and he is doing well.



## **PFC Hope**



Hope also came into BSR's care in 2015.

Heartworm positive, malnourished, and terribly scared, she has endured months of treatment and therapy treatment (which still goes on to this day). She is now with her permanent foster family – due to her water therapy, she has a newfound love of swimming, which is helping with her ongoing rehabilitation.

Hershey was born in 2003. When he was 11 years old, he came into Boykin Spaniel Rescue due to the death of both of his owners. The little bit of information acquired from his previous vet showed a history of skin issues, and the owner stated a car, sometime prior to 2013, had hit him. He had difficulty walking on his right rear leg, due to hip dysplasia. Hershey was originally intended to be a foster, and adopted out after veterinary care, but it was soon discovered that he

had severe storm anxiety, as well as major trust issues. BSR determined it to be in the best interest of Hershey to be placed in the PFC Program, with his foster family. Now 13, Hershey is pain free and is learning to trust.

#### **PFC Vivian**

PFC Vivian came into BSR's care in 2014, as an owner surrender. She was 8 years old and suffered from severe seizures. With an amazing foster and medication therapy, her seizures are managed and she is thriving.



#### **PFC Junior**

Junior was a senior Boykin found in a high kill shelter in GA. After being pulled by BSR, it was noted during transport that Junior had significant hearing loss. In addition, the cataracts in his eyes were obvious on intake and Junior was not always "on target" when walking around strange places. He needed routine, stability and love for just who he was, a senior in the twilight of his years. Junior is well loved, and although he needs to be closely

monitored, is a happy, loving dog.

### **PFC Rosie**

Rosie came in to BSR's care in 2014, along with her sister Daisy. They were an owner surrender-- the wife had died and the husband was in a nursing home. Shortly after coming into care, Daisy crossed the Rainbow Bridge peacefully, in a sunny spot in the back yard surrounded by her foster Mom, her pack and Rosie.

Rosie loves to play outside with her foster siblings, but spends a lot of her time napping. She does get bursts of energy and loves to play..... and is very active for 14 years

old!

#### PFC Allie

Allie is a great companion. She loves to take long walks on a leash, and has become quite comfortable napping on the sofa and hanging out with her two "sister" cats. She is deaf and her hips are bad, but she is a trooper who just wants to go, go, go!



**PFC Castin** 

Castin came into BSR's care in 2012. With some severe anxiety issues, he is now content, being a wonderful companion for his Permanent Foster family!

# PFC Lily

Lily had required blood transfusions while in the shelter before she came to us. Upon intake, she needed an emergency hysterectomy as she started to hemorrhage. This poor senior girl also has a heart murmur due to advanced heartworm disease. As a dog who had lived her whole life outdoors, she needed to transition to an indoor/outdoor dog. Now settled in with her permanent foster family, she will live the rest of her life in the care of her experienced fosters, with the love and care she has never known.
